CASE STUDY: Oral Rehabilitation of Atrophic Maxilla using Zygomatic Implants

Patient Jane (not her real name) was referred to me by another dental professional in the area who was busy with their patient load, and Jane's needs were more complex than they wanted to take on.

I met with Jane at her initial consultation, then had a follow-up visit with full X-rays.

Jane had severely atrophic maxilla and Classic Combination Syndrome. About 10 years ago, she lost her maxillary teeth after a traumatic car accident. She was wearing dentures but recently had dental implants placed for a maxillary overdenture. When I met her, one implant had already failed, another one was stuck in her denture! (image on right...) She had been going through various surgical treatments for 1.5 years with little success.



My diagnosis was for immediate extractions, implant placement, and immediate load of both maxilla and mandible in order to correct her occlusal plane and restore functional occlusion. After explaining the treatment plan, Jane decided to move forward. Her treatment plan included working with me to manage the case and an oral surgeon to place her new teeth. The total treatment time was 9 months, but her teeth were fixed the same day as surgery.



Jane enjoyed having fixed teeth for the first time in over 10 years and told my office, "I wish I had done this sooner. I suffered for so many years and my dentist tried hard but didn't seem to know how to handle my situation. I just love my smile. Now, if only my medical insurance would pay for it!"

I gave her my full warranty (that I give to all referred patients) and sent her back to the referring doctor's office for long-term care.

Conventional Impression Technique compared to Digital Impression Technique – Which Is Better?

A clinical trial was recently reported in the *Journal of Prosthodontics* to compare conventional or digital impression techniques.

Forty-two patients were randomly allocated into two groups to determine if either technique had a significant impact on procedure times, patient discomfort, and outcome.

Findings from this trial include:

- Conventional impression technique took 6 minutes longer, on average, than digital.
- Conventional impressions were reported to cause nearly 7 times more discomfort for patients than digital, using a visual analog scale (VAS).
- The digital impression technique showed better results for occlusal contacts.
- Digital impressions were concluded to be more efficient, convenient, and effective than conventional methods.

Notes about these findings:

Sometimes it can be challenging to make 3D printed models that are stable and that can reproduce the scans. However, advances in scanning technology are improving in both speed and accuracy.

While CAD-CAM casts are usually more accurate than the 3D printed casts, the technology will improve significantly in the near future.

◆ Why other dental professionals work with a Prosthodontist
